Introduction:

- A. Whatever the last year means to you, it is a time for beginning again. We don't have to dread the future simply because of the past. Nor do we have to see in it an escape from burdens and despair.
- B. If you are genuinely satisfied with this past year's accomplishment, you may be a little reluctant to see 2018 end. But it could also be that if this past year has been good to you, you are probably facing the year 2019 with keen anticipation and objective joy. However, if 2018 has dealt you some experiences that have seemed harsh and cruel, your thinking may be callused enough to dread the year 2019 as simply the repetition of a hard lot in life. Whatever the New Year and a New Century means to you, it is time for beginning again!
- C. We live in a world that calculates by the calendar, so we would do well to have a balanced account with God and man every day, but especially at the New Year. Changing from 2018 to 2019 can provide a reference point for new resolves and happy challenges. These should be made up of real commitments, submissions and surrenders based not only on our strengths and determinations, but in the security of the living God (Phil. 4:19).
- D. May you, through determined resolve, have in the year 2016 the kind of spiritual experience that will prepare you for eternity. As the poet Helen Jackson wrote:

"Only a night from old to new,

Only a sleep from night to morn.

The new is but the old come true,

Each sunrise sees a New Year born."

E. "Never Again" can we reclaim the past. What Mother Nature gives, Father Time takes away. Today is the tomorrow you worried about yesterday.

 - 1. Christ empowers us i.e. He gives us the strength we need!
 - 2. This comes through the knowledge of God's Word 2 Tim 4:17
- C. God's might to direct me,

God's power to protect me,

God's wisdom for learning,

God's eye for discerning,

God's ear for my hearing,

God's Word for my clearing.
